# THE FUTURE OF CATHOLICISM IN AUSTRALIA

## Sr Joan Chittister OSB

Joan Chittister is one of the most influential religious and social leaders of our time. For 50 years she has passionately advocated on behalf of peace, human rights, women's issues, and church renewal. A much sought-after speaker, counsellor and clear voice that bridges across all religions, she is also a best-selling author of more than 60 books, hundreds of articles, and an online column for the <u>National Catholic</u> <u>Reporter</u>.

Joan's address will combine practical proposals and visionary ideas around the themes of synodality, subsidiarity, inclusivity, transparency and accountability. She will relate her presentation to local and overseas contexts, such as the Plenary Council process and submissions, Vatican II documents and the words of Pope Francis. The signs of the times indicate we are at a critical moment with potential for creating a better future for our Church in this country. Joan's proposed visit to Australia for several public addresses in 2020 was quickly booked out.

Joan's presentation will be followed by small group (breakout) discussions, a plenary session and her own closing/summary comments. Archbishop Mark Coleridge, President of the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference supports the Convocation and will send his greetings to Convocation participants.

### **Convocation Aims.**

- To promote a vision for the future of Catholicism, informed by the lives of ordinary people, particularly in the context of the forthcoming Plenary Council;
- To give a voice to Catholics, promote critical thinking and build personal confidence through sharing ideas and perspectives, particularly in the light of Vatican II and the leadership of Pope Francis;
- To address the role of women in the Church and gender balance in decision making and ministry;
- To promote justice with special regard to LGBTIQA+ people;
- To explore Church teachings that hinder participation by Catholics;
- To identify areas needing improvement in accountability, transparency and inclusiveness;
- To initiate and support lay movements for renewal and reform;
- To assist the bishops of Australia in understanding the priorities and concerns of the faithful.

The sense of the faith of the Catholic people of Australia yearns for greater inclusion of all, more involvement of the laity, and a greater role for women. These issues were

among the four most widely discussed issues in the Plenary Council submissions across all dioceses.<sup>1</sup>

#### An open invitation

All people seeking Church renewal, lay, religious, clergy, bishops, members of other churches or none and community groups, are invited to join us in this significant gathering. The convocations will be open to everyone with no registration or participation fees.

Participants will be able to log in individually or meet in face-to-face groups in various locations in Australia or overseas. The convocation will be conducted as a zoom-type conference facilitated by the Australian Catholic University (ACU). Because of the time difference between the USA and Australia, this convocation will be at 9.00am AEST.

This will be the first of three convocations, being convened by the Australasian Catholic Coalition for Church Reform (ACCCR) as part of our journey to the Plenary Council and beyond. Others are scheduled for 26 August and 4 November 2021, before and after the first Plenary Council assembly.
